






Physical Education News



Your student has learned all about BULLYING!

During guidance class, Grades 2-5 have FINISHED the Bullying Prevention Unit, while kindergarteners and first graders finished learning about problem solving, conflict resolution, and including others.



By the end of the unit, here's what the students will have learned:

Bullying

when someone *repeatedly* hurts, scares, or makes another person feel bad *on purpose*



Empowering Strategies for Dealing with Bullying

Assertiveness

Help them practice using a strong, clear voice and maintaining eye contact

Being an Upstander


Teach your child to stand up for others
who are being bullied

Confidence Building

Teach positive self-talk to boost their self-esteem

Buddy System

Encourage your child to stick with friends or a group when they feel unsafe



Emphasize the importance of reporting any bullying incidents to a trusted adult, whether it's a teacher, school counselor, and/or you as a parent





Tips for TRUSTED ADULTS

HOW TO REPORT BULLYING

STAY CALM

If you see or experience bullying, try to stay calm and composed.

FIND A SAFE SPACE

Move to a safe and quiet space where you feel comfortable talking about the situation.

FIND A TRUSTED ADULT
Choose one of the trusted adults you identified earlier as someone you can talk to about the bullying incident.

USE "I" STATEMENTS
When reporting use "I" statements to

When reporting, use "I" statements to express your feelings and describe the situation without blaming. "I felt upset when..."

PROVIDE DETAILS

Share specific details about the incident,

including who was involved, what happened, when and where it occurred.

BE HONEST

Be honest and open about your feelings. Let the trusted adult know the impact the bullying has had on you.

Listen to the guidance and advice provided by the trusted adult. They are there to help and support you.

FOLLOW UP

If necessary, follow up with the trusted adult to let them know about any changes related to the bullying situation.

Wear a face covering for 10 days when around others.


Monitor for symptoms and test if possible.

Monitor your Child's Symptoms

TWO or more of these symptoms:

- Fatigue
- Muscle/body aches
- Headache
- . Congestion or runny nose

Stay Home

Testing is recommended.

If no symptoms or symptoms are resolving after 3 days and have not had a fever for 24 hours without the use of a fever-reducing medication, the student may return to school

Communicate with school symptoms are resolving to return

Dear Parent/Guardian:

It is that time of year where there are a lot of illnesses going around! SDFA currently has not seen a sharp increase in any one illness but want to help inform you of what is out there right now. It is important to know the difference between influenza (flu), Covid-19, cold and norovirus (stomach flu) symptoms. All are extremely contagious. Influenza, Covid-19 and cold viruses are spread from person to person through coughing and sneezing. Norovirus is spread by touching surfaces or objects and eating food or drinking liquids contaminated with the virus.

Norovirus- the stomach bug, causes acute gastroenteritis (inflammation of the stomach and intestines)

Symptoms may include Extreme diarrhea vomiting stomach pain/cramping headache fever

Steps to keep your child healthy:

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the best way to prevent influenza infection is to get a flu vaccine. There is no vaccine available for norovirus.

Talk to your child about practicing good health habits:

Wash hands frequently with soap and warm water for at least 20 seconds. Alcohol-based hand sanitizers can also be used if soap and water is not available.

Cover mouth and nose into the inside of the elbow or with a tissue when sneezing or coughing and dispose of the tissue immediately into the trash.

Avoid sharing drinks, water bottles, eating utensils and cell phones.

Prevent spreading illness to others:

Keep your sick child home from school until he/she has not had a fever, vomited and/or loose stool for 24 hours without the use of medication, and can actively participate in school. It is important for your ill child to get rest and drink plenty of fluids. At home, disinfect frequently touched surfaces, toys, and commonly shared items.

Please contact your doctor if you feel your child has any of the above symptoms and is not improving or is showing new symptoms.




From the Nurse Office

Head lice happen, especially on kids. They are not a sign of poor hygiene or how clean your home is. Anyone can get them—doesn't matter how long your hair is or how much you shower.

Fortunately, they don't spread disease and can't live more than two days off our heads. So if your kids get them you don't have to clean every inch of your home. Head lice eggs won't hatch unless they are on hair and they won't infest pets. They spread when kids touch their heads together and sometimes from sharing hair accessories.

Does your kid have head lice? Not everyone gets itchy. Use a nit comb on wet hair and look for bugs the size of a sesame seed or tiny eggs glued to the hair. Check everyone in your household. If you do catch a bug, compare it with this picture:



If you find head lice:

- Use either an over-the-counter OR prescription medication intended for treatment of head lice. Follow the label directions exactly.
- Wash pillowcases and anything else that had contact with the child's head in the past 48 hrs. Use a hot dryer. If you can't wash it, leave it in a bag for 2 weeks.
- Re-treat the hair after 7-9 days or according to label directions. No lice product kills 100% of the eggs, so you have to kill the newly hatched bugs.
- Continue to use the nit comb on wet hair to remove old evidence and check for new head lice-DAILY for at least 2 weeks

District Updates & Reminders





Like many Wisconsin school districts, the School District of Fort Atkinson faces significant financial challenges that are largely the result of three factors:



A lack of funding for public education from the state legislature in recent years



Rapidly increasing expenses and inflation



The state's outdated school funding formula

To address these challenges, the School Board has approved an operational referendum question that will appear on the ballot **Tuesday**, **April 2**, **2024**.

On April 2, 2024, our community will vote on a proposed solution to these financial challenges. If voters approve the referendum, the district will be able to exceed its revenue limit by \$6.5 million per year for the next three years.

With a continued priority for student safety and wellbeing, approved referendum funds would:



Preserve current programs, services, and staffing relative to enrollment



Maintain current programs and course offerings



Retain highquality teachers and staff

The School Board recently **lowered the property tax levy rate by \$1.31** for the 2023-24 school year to **\$9.61**. That represents a **12.21% decrease** and is the lowest mill rate in a decade for the School District of Fort Atkinson

An approved operational referendum would <u>not</u> increase the property tax levy rate of \$9.61 per \$1,000 of assessed property value in our community.

An operational referendum is necessary to maintain current programming, retain high-quality teachers and staff, and provide residents with the high-quality schools they have come to expect.


